

GETTING THE INFORMATION I NEED

Post-secondary website: www.edu.gov.on.ca

(look at the information available on the left side of the website and look at the centre column: what kinds of programs are offered by community colleges? Notice the wide range and that there are no deadends!)

Colleges → Seneca → Business Administration: Human Resources → Admission Requirements → Georgian → Future Students → Academics(top right) → A-Z programs → Culinary Mgt. → more information

Searching for a program, but not sure at which college?

Go to search for programs on the web (centre column), click on program locator, on the left, go to Recreation and Fitness (for example), choose ALL for colleges, pick your semester, start your search and it will tell you there are 45 programs that fit this category. You can, of course, narrow it down to certain community colleges as well.

For universities in Ontario, you can follow the same procedures, using the Ontario Ministry of Education website. (again here, you can find lots of helpful general information: look at lefthand column and the centre column, with their links)

The other website that is probably the most effecient for

looking up information on Ontario universities, is www.electronicinfo.ca Go to English, then to program locator ...decide how you want to search. If you go to Program of Study, you can then click on K for Kinesiology and it will list all the universities that offer that program. If you then go to Brock, it shows two programs and if you click on those programs, you can see what the requirements are for each. It is obvious that one is more science based than the other. To investigate that further you could go to the university website and read up on the differences.

Universities → Brock University → Prospective students → Undergraduate → Academic Programs → Kinesiology (look at description) → back to Admissions → Undergraduate → Grade 12 U/M Academic Requirements

Apprenticeships: you can follow the same procedures, using the Ontario Ministry of Education website. (again here, you can find lots of helpful general information: look at lefthand column and the centre column, with their links)

To find out what high school courses students need, go to www.edu.gov.on.ca/training/apprenticeship/skills/pathwaye.pdf and it will let you know what you need to get into the specific trades. Please note that almost all trades

require students to have taken a Physics course in Grade 11 or 12.
